“Hidden And Not So Hidden Bias In Research”

Bias in research is a problem that concerns researchers, consumers, policy makers and other users of evidence. Researchers strive to reduce bias in their research and make it transparent, but researcher conflicts of interest create a risk of bias. A variety of methods have been used to identify “bias”—the systematic error or deviation from the true results or inferences of a study—in clinical research. Bias related to funding sources or investigator conflicts of interest can be introduced throughout the entire research process (questions asked, design, conduct or publication). Global transparency initiatives have enabled the detection of previously hidden financial ties between researchers and pharmaceutical companies. Professor Bero will discuss a number of ongoing efforts aimed at identifying conflicts of interest and reducing bias in clinical research and practice.
